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



A Tennis Block Party specifically geared towards individuals with disabilities of any kind is taking place at Mullen High School on May 17 along with a workshop for players and instructors interested in learning adaptive tennis techniques.

By making diversity awareness and education a high priority in all aspects of our organization, committees and board operations, the governing body for the sport in Colorado is becoming an even stronger organization and community leader. Diversity is here, it's inclusiveness that is often lacking. The USTA Colorado Multicultural Diversity Plan guides us on this journey towards inclusiveness at all levels of tennis. Volunteer driven community tennis associations (CTAs), like Eastside Tennis Association in NE Denver and the Fort Collins Tennis Association, have received grants to support youth tennis program development and scholarships for junior players and organization leaders to attend life-changing workshops and camps. Find out more about CTAs located throughout the state by visiting COLORADOTENNIS.com and selecting the Community section. There you will find links to all registered CTAs in Colorado wanting to hear from tennis enthusiasts in their areas. If you are interested in starting a new CTA or want to improve your existing one you may find some new ideas simply by previewing other CTA's websites.

Some CTAs are also reaching out to youngsters who may not otherwise have the opportunity to play tennis and have joined the nation-wide network of National Junior Tennis League. Net Results Junior Tennis in Denver is one example of an NJTL program that is instilling the values of leadership and aca-

demic excellence in youngsters and giving kids an opportunity to develop tennis skills. The Arthur Ashe Essay contest, Tennis Leadership Camp and Regional Rallies are all benefits unique to registered NJTL programs.

IT STARTS IN THE PARKS

With nearly 70% of all tennis being played on public courts, park and recreation agencies are a critical partner for USTA Colorado. The Tennis in the Parks (TIP) initiative is a national partnership between National Recreation & Parks Association



(NRPA) and the USTA that supports local parks and recreation agencies that are enthusiastic about increasing tennis participation in their communities. Participating agencies across Colorado are seeing increases in tennis participation as a result of the support and benefits provided to them, along with their communities' interest in the lifetime sport of tennis. TIP also focuses on making sure that public tennis infrastructure is in optimum condition through USTA Public Facility Funding as well as assistance in developing an advocacy agenda to support tennis in communities' master planning process. Utah Park in Aurora, Redstone Park in Highlands Ranch, Littleton Golf & Tennis Center and Rolland Moore Racquet Complex in Fort Collins are just a few past winners of USTA's Outstanding Facility award reflecting the high quality public tennis facilities that are available to Colorado residents. We expect TIP participation to increase in 2008 through the committed efforts of existing programs and the addition of new agencies.

ADVOCACY & INFRASTRUCTURE

The advocacy efforts of committed citizens like those in Durango, Grand Junction, Montrose and Longmont, just to name a few, have resulted in building stronger communities by offering healthy activities like tennis. CTAs often lead the way in building partnerships with their local parks and recreation agencies and

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

schools to make the incredible benefits of tennis more extensively available to their communities through increased and/or improved tennis facilities and programs. When Canyon View Park in Grand Junction was built in 2004, six new tennis courts were included in the park plan as a result of advocacy efforts from the local CTA working with the City of Grand Junction. They did not stop there, however, and by the end of 2008 the park will be home to a total of twelve beautiful tennis courts (along with bathrooms and a shelter) that are consistently used for local ladders, tournaments, leagues and lessons. USTA Colorado contributed to the facility through matching Adopt-A-Court grant funding for bench/shade shelters in between the tennis courts. The USTA is here to assist tennis advocates in their efforts to ensure enough quality public tennis facilities exist in communities.

TENNIS IN OUR SCHOOLS

There's one place where more people are being introduced to the sport than anywhere else in Colorado: In schools!

Over 300 schools from throughout the state are introducing the sport of tennis to their students through PE which means an estimated 110,000 youngsters have access to the comprehensive, lifetime benefits afforded by the sport of tennis. Tennis is the ideal sport to help schools achieve their health and wellness goals. Our commitment to helping kids learn a lifetime sport – as well as self-confidence, sportsmanship and the habits of an active, healthy lifestyle - is backed by numerous resources for physical educators and after school program providers. We want to ensure that all kids have an opportunity to play and learn this lifetime sport. USTA Colorado is helping school districts implement tennis programming and build a selfsustaining tennis program for their school community with topnotch training by professionals, a comprehensive curriculum kit, technical expertise and discounted tennis equipment. INVESTING AT GRASSROOTS LEVELS

Schools, parks and recreation agencies, youth-service providers, CTAs and nursing homes are just some of the places where USTA Colorado has planted the seeds of tennis through grants, totaling more than \$35,000 in 2007! Twice a year (April 1 and October 1 deadlines) USTA Colorado and the Colorado Youth Tennis Foundation accept grant applications from organizations located in rural, mountain, city and suburban Colorado communities that are seeking dollars to get a program started or to expand the scope of an existing tennis program. Funds specifically earmarked for adult/senior, adaptive, multicultural participation and youth ensure financial support is available for programs reaching any component

of the population. Adopt-A-Court grants help communities' renovate cracked and worn out tennis courts. The answers to many funding questions, as well as a grant application, can be found at COLORADOTENNIS.com under the Community section. The Intermountain Section and USTA also have grant programs in place to support efforts to grow the game at the grassroots level.

CAPITALIZING ON THE MOMENTUM

Some welcomed challenges that come along with this increased participation include having enough volunteers and people working with us to bring tennis to all corners of the state. Diversity efforts are going strong and we welcome more individuals getting involved with this initiative.

We are also doing all we can to ensure enough quality tennis instructors/staff are equipped to introduce tennis to entry-level players. USTA Colorado is doing its best to develop quality instructors who have the tools to develop structure tennis programs around the state. We are constantly seeking enthusiastic tennis players and instructors who want

to get involved with community-based tennis programs on a volunteer basis. To support these individuals, at least four Recreational Coach Workshops are scheduled during the first half of 2008 to provide tennis instruction and coaching to recreational tennis instructors and coaches in a 6-hour on court format. Organized Play Workshops are a new 90-120 minute training that teaches games-based formats to those focused on extracurricular, school-based tennis programs.

AT USTA COLORADO, WE BELIEVE EVERY CHILD SHOULD LEARN HOW TO PLAY TENNIS

Nearly 20% of children 6-8 are overweight, which astonishingly has increased near-

ly 200% over the past three decades. Many experts believe this is due in part to children not being regularly active in sports or other physically enduring games. Tennis is a sport that develops all the most important motor and coordinative skills from an early age. It requires and develops agility, speed and endurance. All of these skills will benefit a child's long-term health and performance in all sports.

Tennis is a technically demanding sport. To improve, a child has to be able to concentrate well and apply themselves to the many challenges that the game brings. As an individual sport, tennis requires and develops confidence and the ability to cope with and perform under pressure. You have to be able to bounce back from disappointments, cope with success and, occasionally, failure. The fantastic news for parents (and kids) is that research has shown that children who develop these skills through sport can transfer them into other areas of their lives.

Tennis provides children with a place they can go and be independent, meet friends and be active. It also provides children with a way of meeting new friends whenever they move to a new area. Whether it is moving to a new school or to a new job, the local tennis court will always provide great social opportunities.

Tennis is a game that you can play your entire life. Most people retire from highly physical sports – particularly those that involve contact – fairly early in their lives. Tennis allows you to be active for much longer than most other sports.

Family time can revolve around a tennis match. There are few sports that offer the opportunity to play with your kids, side by side, as they grow older. Much has been written about how an afternoon of tennis provides a chance for families to spend time together outside of the chaos of everyday life.

Tennis is gender and skill level neutral. Mixed crowds and players of varying skill levels can all get along and enjoy the opportunity to get some exercise and have fun together.

Today, kids have more options than ever for what to do with their free time. Tennis no longer has to compete with other traditional sports alone. The marketplace in the sporting world has continued to grow exponentially with the rise of "extreme" and other non-traditional sports. And, of course, in addition to athletics, tennis goes head-to-head with technology – including computers, the internet, video games, and iPods.

Tennis is just one sport that can get children physically fit (as it works out the arms, legs and cardiovascular), but tennis is also a sport that has psychological benefits to go with it.

INTRODUCING THE QUICKSTART TENNIS FORMAT

the new way to play for kids 10 and under

Studies have indicated that those taking part in sports activities on a regular basis showed an increase in academic performance and memory. Scientists at the University of Illinois found that tennis might actually generate new connections between the nerves in the brain, due to the sport's requirement of alertness and tactical thinking.

The vast array of play choices for children means that tennis has to be – more than ever before – especially accessible, fun and easy to play. To get children into the game and to keep them playing, there needs to be a fast and fun way for them to get started.







TRY THIS ON FOR SIZE

QuickStart utilizes two court sizes to maximize the players' enjoyment and skill development.

The 8 & unders use onehalf of a doubles court (see diagram). At 36'x18' and with a shorter net (2'9"), kids find it easier to sustain a rally and develop angles at a much earlier age. One bonus for busy facilities: four matches can be going simultaneously in this setup.

The 10 & unders utilize the full court, but with temporary lines trimming the overall area back (60'x21' singles, 60'x27' doubles), virtually cutting in half the amount of court a developing player has to cover.

With this in mind, the USTA – with input and support from the Tennis Industry Association, PTR, USPTA, and NRPA – has developed a new play format aimed at children 10 & under, with the express purpose of getting them in the game, playing quickly, and keeping them in the game.

This new format, QuickStart Tennis, will launch officially in March 2008. QuickStart will utilize court size, equipment (racquets and balls) and scoring that will be tailored to the age and size of the children playing.

"The QuickStart format is tennis scaled to the size of the child, utilizing age approp,riate equipment, including smaller racquets, lower bouncing balls, and smaller courts," said USTA'S Kurt Kamperman, Chief Executive, Community Tennis. "By enabling kids to start playing right away, we are allowing them to learn as they play."

Indeed, that idea is the core of

Many aspects of the QuickStart Tennis format have been utilized before. Transition balls and smaller



courts have been seen around tennis for years. But, aligning these elements with age, racquet size



and scoring methods is what makes this format different, and more effective. QuickStart. After all, the majority of youth sports have followed this very formula for years. Baseball begins with smaller bats, smaller fields, and progresses from tee ball, to coach pitch, to player pitch. Basketball and soccer also utilize similar methods, including shortened playing surfaces and age- and size-appropriate equipment.

By being introduced to this style of play from the start, children gain confidence by seeing their immediate progress, and will therefore have a desire to keep playing.

To further emphasize the importance of properly sized equipment and courts, the QuickStart format is broken down into two age groups: 8 & under and 10 & under.

For children 8 & under, the size of the court will be 36' x 18'. The set-up utilizes doubles sidelines as the base-

lines, and from the baseline to the service line as the new sidelines. Racquets will be up to 23" in size, making them easier to control than larger-sized racquets. The balls, either a foam ball or a very low compression ball, will also match the abilities of the child, bouncing lower and traveling less distance. This will teach the child to have proper swing technique, with the ball bouncing into their "comfort zones." The net height will be 2' 9", making it easier for the child to continue the rally. Finally, scoring is brought down to a much simpler level - best of three games, with the first player to win seven points winning the game – and a shorter time.

For children 10 & under, the size of the court will be 60' x 21' (60' x 27' for doubles). The racquet will be up to 25" in size, still manageable, but increasing with their body-size and age. The ball, a low-compression ball, travels a little faster and farther than the ball utilized

by the 8 & under group. It will still have a lower bounce than the standard tennis ball. Scoring becomes best of three sets, with 4 games winning a set, and the third set being first to 7 points (if necessary).

"The beauty of the QuickStart Tennis format is that it brings the kids into the game immediately and gets them rallying by the end of their first time out on the court, because the game is finally brought to their size and speed" said Kirk Anderson, Director, Recreational Coaches & Programs, USTA. "The format is easily incorporated into any existing programming, from lesson plans to competition, which allows for this to integrate into all facets of tennis."

That is obviously essential, because it does not mean that new lesson plans, new programming and new competitions have to be created. QuickStart just enables kids to have more quality experiences early on, which keeps them

in the game. And more kids in the game obviously equates to more kids on the courts

That's another benefit of QuickStart. It allows for more kids to be on the court at once. This is because facilities can put multiple 36' courts onto a regulation court at once. In fact, one could have as many as six 36' courts on one regulation court at once. On both sides of the court you could have: (1) net to service line, (2) service line to baseline and (3) baseline to the edge of the backcourt.

And by getting more kids playing more quickly in a more enjoyable environment, QuickStart ought to prove an effective tool in increasing participation. By having more kids in the game, it's possible to have more high level players down the road.

"QuickStart will make a significant impact on the skill development of players in the United States," said Paul Roetert, Managing Director, Player



Development, USTA. "By bringing more kids into the game at a young age, and by providing them with a play format that helps them to utilize proper stroke technique and overall skill development, we will increase the pool of high level players throughout the country."

Many aspects of QuickStart have been utilized before. Transition balls and smaller courts have been seen around tennis for years. But aligning these elements with age, racquet size and scoring methods is what makes this format different, and more effective.

"Pros have been using slower balls and smaller courts for years, but this will help to set standard specifications that can be consistent whenever the QuickStart format is used, which has never been done before," said Kamperman. "What is also important is that in the past the use of different

equipment or shortened courts was only used in lesson plans, but our goal is to have this format incorporated into all aspects of youth tennis, including competition."

QuickStart will roll-out in 2008 in over 1.000 facilities, which are expected to incorporate it within their existing 10 & under programming. In the upcoming year the USTA will work with the PTR to organize and implement training sessions, both to coaches and volunteers including parents, to help proliferate the format. In addition, the USTA has begun incorporating the format into USTA Junior Team Tennis, and its tournament offerings. In succeeding years, it will continue to be implemented into programming with the goal of reaching all aspects of 10 & under youth tennis, including tournament, lesson based, recreational and team play.

QUICKSTART TENNIS IN COLORADO

The USTA will officially launch QuickStart Tennis in Spring 2008, and USTA Colorado is excited to assist facilities in implementing the new format.



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TOURNAMENT TENNIS 101:

YOUR GUIDE TO TOURNAMENT PLAY IN COLORADO

For many players, the word tournament conjures up images of professional athletes slugging it out on a far-away continent in front of thousands of fans and with millions of dollars on the line.

But for the vast majority of players, tournament tennis is really about sowing their competitive oats at a local event, far removed from the cameras and the throngs of cheering spectators.

In fact, most of the crowds at these events

consist of parents, children, husbands and wives and perhaps a handful of friends and other familiar faces. The environment is competitive, but nurturing. Tournaments also provide a chance to meet new friends, see old acquaintances, and get in a great workout. Some events even host player barbecues and dish out cool giveaways. A growing number of junior events provide lunch, a player pool party and a full day's worth of scheduled match play, so you can plan your life around the event.

The 2008 Colorado Sanctioned Tournament Schedule lists nearly 150 events that will test your skills, provide you the chance to meet new people, and give you the opportunity to change it up from your everyday social matches and weekly league play. Tournaments exist to provide a meaningful and inspiring experience to all entrants, with lots of good competition so that everyone will continue to play and enjoy the game.



SANCTIONED TOURNAMENTS & MEMBERSHIP:

USTA Colorado endorses events that meet certain USTA criteria for quality and consistency. Only Sanctioned Event results count toward state rankings and NTRP ratings. Non-sanctioned tournament results do not factor into rankings nor ratings.

All NTRP, Senior, Championship and Wheelchair sanctioned events require a current USTA membership, as do Junior Championship and Satellite events. Junior Novice and non-Sanctioned events do not require a USTA membership. In an effort to inspire junior beginner players to participate in tournament play, USTA Colorado will purchase a USTA Junior Membership for any novice junior wanting to compete in Satellite events. But sanctioned tournaments are not the only events you should consider if you're looking for competitve matches. There may be dozens of non-sanctioned events taking place at facilities across the state that are not listed in these pages. Check the bulletin board at your local facility for information about those events.

If you're new to tournament tennis, you may not be completely familiar with the various types of events offered, or how one format may be more to your liking than another. We encourage you to take the time to read through our 2008 Colorado Tournament Guide, and acquaint yourself with the different types of formats that you're likely to encounter this year. And if you're really into playing tournaments, be sure to sign up to receive BLAST!, USTA Colorado's monthly e-newsletter. Each issue contains a list of upcoming events and links to each tournament.

TOURNAMENT TENNIS 101:

FINDING THE RIGHT EVENT:

Many factors can help determine the right event for you or your child. Age, skill level, fitness and length of tournament can all be deciding factors in determining which tournaments you should entert. Here's some basic information about the types of events Colorado has to offer:

Junior Novice:

Novice events offer juniors the opportunity to experience tournament play and competition in a supportive and non-threatening environment.

Novice players have no previous competitive experience in tournament play (above the novice level), and have typically played tennis for two years or less. Because these events are non-sanctioned, a USTA membership is not required and results do not count towards rankings.

Junior Satellite:

Satellite events offer junior players the opportunity to experience the next level of competitive play. Acting as a bridge between Novice and Championship-level events, Satellite events cater to players with one to three years of beginning competitive experience (i.e., novice tournaments, CARA, novice or intermediate USTA Junior Team Tennis play). Once a player has gained confidence in novice tournaments, or has won a total of three different novice events in any combination of singles, doubles, or mixed, that player can reasonably compete at the Satellite level.

A player is ineligible for the Satellite level play if:

- 1. Player attained a National or Sectional (Intermountain region) ranking the previous year;
- 2. Player reached:
 - a) the quarterfinals of a Designated Championship tournament (in-district), or
 - b) the semifinals of any sanctioned Championship tournament event (in-district).

A Satellite Ineligibility List will be published annually based on the prior year's results. The Seeding & Ranking Committee periodically may determine additional players to be ineligible for Satellite level play based on recent Championship or Satellite tournament results. Players are strongly encouraged to play within their age group in the Championship level

rather than playing up an age group in the Satellite level. The Seeding and Ranking Committee will consider written appeals from players for the Satellite ineligible list until April 14, 2008.

Junior Championship:

The Championship level is designed for the junior player who is seeking the highest level of junior competition in Colorado. Satellite players who are seeking more advanced tournament play may also compete at this level.

Players listed on the 2008 Satellite Ineligible List – published on COLORADOTENNIS.com in March 2008 – are required to play at this level. Juniors seeking to compete at the Sectional and National levels are encouraged to compete in Championship-level events.

NTRP Events:

Designed to pit players of compatible skill against one another. NTRP levels range from 2.5 to 5.0 Note: players rated above 5.0 are required to play in the Open division; any junior player 18 & under MUST play in the Open division, unless the player turns 19 by December 31, 2008. They are then eligible to compete in an NTRP event, but must contact the Tournament Director for entry.

You may play at or above your specific NTRP level, but not below your rating. If you don't have a current rating, you may self-rate and play in that division. For information on NTRP ratings, see COLORADOTENNIS.com.

Senior Events:

Also called age division events, these pit players 30 and older against similarly aged competitors. But be aware: there are no skill parameters in Senior Events. A player in the draw may be an expert, a novice, or anywhere in between. Players must be of division age by December 31, 2008, and may not play in an older division.

13 THINGS EVERY TOURNAMENT PLAYER SHOULD KNOW

GETTING "HELP" AT COLORADOTENNIS.com:

Not to be biased, but our search features are infinitely simpler and more accurate than the USTA's TennisLink. Hit COLORADOTENNIS.com and use the "Helpful Links" dropdown menu. Click "Find a Tourney". You can search by tournament name, or division. You can also look for tournaments in progress, those open for registration and completed tournaments. Finding a court has never been easier. Click "Find a Court", type in the name of the facility and Bob's Your Uncle. It's like having an EASY BUTTON.

CHECKING YOUR STANDING

You're not vain, you just want to see where you stand in your division. Just go to COLORADOTENNIS.com and use the "Helpful Links" menu to access division standings.

HEY, THAT KID ISN'T OLD ENOUGH TO PLAY NTRP!

Any player that is 18 years-old, but will be turning 19 by Dec. 31, 2008, is eligible to participate in Adult NTRP events. But there's a catch for 18s who want to register for an event: TennisLink is not set up to accommodate you, so you must contact the tournament director to register for the event. They will happily enter you into the draw.





VERIFY ALL TOURNAMENT INFORMATION ONLINE

Players are encouraged to verify all tournament information online. Look for draw times, weather announcements, schedule changes, hotel information etc. Tournament directors will try to update information whenever possible.

VERIFY ALL DRAW TIMES

It is the *players' responsibility* to obtain and verify all match times. Check the event's online listing two days prior to the start of the event, or verify with tournament staff.

TENNISLINK/ACTIVE.COM FEE

Last year, all TennisLink events joined the Active.com network, resulting in a processing fee of



\$3 per event entry. For example, if a tournament charges \$25 for a singles event, you will be charged \$28 for that event. Please note this is an Active.com fee, not a fee charged by the tournament.

KNOW AND OBSERVE "THE CODE"

If you have not already done so, try and familiarize yourself with "The Code" (see next page). This can help if any issues or questions arise during a match and there is not an umpire on site. You can find the code in the FRIEND AT COURT or online at COLORADOTENNIS.com.





DON'T WALK ACROSS THE BACK OF ANOTHER COURT UNTIL THE PLAYERS HAVE FINISHED PLAYING A POINT

THIS CAN BE DISTRACTING TO THEM AND AFFECT THEIR PLAY.








RANKINGS REOUIREMENTS

COLORADO RANKINGS SHIFT TO POINTS PER ROUND

Beginning in 2008, all Senior, NTRP, Championship, Family events, and Junior Satellite tournaments will be utilizing a Points Per Round (PPR) system to determine Colorado rankings (Junior Championship made the switch to PPR in 2007).

PPR is very simple process. Players earn points for each win, plus earn bonus points for wins over "Top 20" players. Sanctioned events are broken down to Designated/Level 1 and non-Designated/Level 2 tournaments (see chart below).

Level 1 tournaments carry more points than Level 2 events.

Players accumulating a minimum of 150 points during the calendar year will earn a year-end ranking. Only a player's three best results* at Colorado sanctioned events will count towards a ranking.

SENIOR DIVISION (30-80), CHAMPIONSHIP & FAMILY REQUIREMENTS:

Players accumulating a minimum of 100 points during the calendar year will earn a year-end ranking. Only a player's two best results at Colorado sanctioned events* will count towards a ranking.

JUNIOR SATELLITE REQUIREMENTS:

Players accumulating a minimum of 150 points during the calendar year will earn a year-end ranking. Only a player's three best results* at Colorado sanctioned events will count towards a ranking.

POINTS PER ROUND AND THE COMPETITIVE JUNIOR

NAVIGATING THE POINTS PER ROUND SYSTEM

Last year, USTA Colorado switched to a Points Per Round (PPR) ranking system for all Colorado Junior Championship Events. Both the USTA and Intermountain Section – as well as most USTA Sections nationwide – had adopted this system, and the switch made Colorado events consistent with those tournaments at the National and Sectional levels (see page 38 for a synopsis of the PPR system).

PROS & CONS

According to Bethany Schott, Player Development Coordinator for the USTA/Intermountain Section, the move to PPR is a positive step for players and tournaments alike.

"There are a bunch of advantages for players and tournaments at the District level," says Schott, "including increased tournament participation, streamlined and consistent rankings, and finally, players can't hide in this system – in order to generate a ranking, players will have to compete."

But as with any change, there will likely be some growing pains.

"Many junior players will be playing up a level rather than their actual age," she explains. "It may be hard to get a true reflection of a player's ranking in the lower or higher age divisions (based on where they play the majority of their tournaments)."

The way the CTA will counteract this is that the points will carry down. Thus, if a 14 year-old player was playing in all 16s tournaments, those tournaments would show up on their 14s and 16s record.

The rumor that PPR only benefits the wealthy who can travel to tournaments and "chase points" is not a concern in our Section and District, says Schott. We only count the top five results in a 12-month period, so an average player that plays in every tournament does not

have advantage over a great player who does well in six or seven major tournaments.

According to Schott, the biggest challenge with PPR is aging up.



AGING UP

Deciding when to start playing up (or playing in an age division higher than yours) is a common dilemma that many parents and players face when deciding on their tournament schedule for the year.

The best way to answer the question is to determine what your goals are as a junior player. Are you a recreational player that enjoys participating in local Colorado tournaments only? Or is it your goal to travel to different tournaments around the Section with the hopes of earning an Intermountain or National ranking? If you lean toward the recreational side, you should continue playing at the local level, and play in the higher age division when you feel you need better competition. If you have aspirations of making it big on the Sectional or National level, Schott has compiled some ideas for you to consider.

First, identify when your birthday

lands in respect to the Intermountain Sectional tournaments. Next, determine when you are hoping to move up in the age division. From that point on you will need to determine when to start playing in the higher age division.

"I would recommend playing up at District tournaments at least 6-9 months in advance, if not sooner," says Schott.

District tournaments are a fantastic way to play up an age division. These results will improve your standings in both your current age division and the higher age division (as points carry down). In some District tournaments it is also acceptable for you to play in two age divisions, with both of those events counting toward your point standings.

Getting accepted into the ITA Circuit tournaments is very competitive. There is a 32-player limit in each age, so it is imperative that you start working on improving your ITA Standing well in advance. Keep in mind that none of your points will carry up to your higher age division. You must start over.

Once you get five solid District tournaments on your Intermountain record, you should be sitting well for most of the Circuit events. The Easter Circuit is a 64-player draw, which makes it a good event at which to age up. In addition, the Section has added a 16s and 18s age division at the Memorial Day Circuit so it will be easier to get into that tournament as well. Our recommendation would be to have played at least one Circuit tournament prior to applying into a Sectional tournament.

Remember, the better you do in the District tournaments, the better your chances are at getting into the ITA Circuit and Sectional tournaments.



WARMING UP ON TOURNAMENT DAY

Not many events boast open courts during the tournament, so any warm-up prior to a match should be done at a different location. Use the Court Locator at COLORADOTENNIS.com to find public courts near the site to warm-up prior to your match.

COME PREPARED WITH THE ESSENTIALS

Don't assume all sites have water on the courts. Come prepared with plenty of fresh water, a hat and sunscreen, especially for those hot summertime matches. Players of all levels should come prepared to every match with at least two freshly strung tennis racquets. If you break a string or even a racquet it is always reassuring to know that you have a back up that you feel comfortable with. This also helps to ensure matches remain on time and don't cause delays looking

to borrow or demo racquets. Showing up without the essentials could easily mean the difference between winning and losing.
